





A PRINCIPAL'S PERSPECTIVE

Welcome to the 2015 version of The Year in Review.

It is a creative and visually stunning way to capture the last twelve months of the life of Albert Park College. This year we have introduced a bolder, more colorful format, featuring images that capture key moments throughout the year.

The images are enhanced by pop up text written by our students. Student input features strongly and it is our students voices that you hear as they tell their stories about what they consider to be the highlights of the year.

What resonated most for me in The Year in Review was the sheer scale of what we have done as a College in 2015. It is a vivid reminder of the wonderful opportunities that students have at Albert Park College.

It is the year that our senior years program was fully embedded at the College with the serious business of large scale exams and VCE study programs driving outstanding academic results. Our emphasis on a high challenge and high demand learning culture is clearly evident as you read about the outstanding work that our students have done this year.

It was also the year that work began on our innovative Year 9 campus at 40 Bay Street. This is a ten million dollar investment which will expand the capacity of the College by over 200 students. Led by the groundbreaking architects 6 Degrees it is a great example of how heritage buildings can be redesigned to support an innovative 21st century learning environment.

Our emphasis on creativity and the arts shines through, perhaps best illustrated through our Annual Art Show which has grown into the single most important artistic event of the year. This has been complemented by performances across the visual, performing and liberal arts.

Music and dance continue to flourish but my personal favorite this year was the school production "At The Cross Roads". I love the fact that this is all original student work and it has been a privilege to watch the growth in creativity and sophistication across the years.

Extension and enrichment activities are also featured. Embedded in our school calendar is the annual ski camp with over one hundred parents and students attending each year. This popular event is complemented by a wide array of camps ranging from year level wilderness based camps to the two week expeditions that are a feature of the Year 9 Da Vinci project.

All of this is driven by the wonderful work of the staff, students and families of Albert Park College. Together, we simply make things happen! The Year in Review is a timely reminder that we really do live by our motto to Lead, Create and Inspire.

2015 has been a landmark year in APC's short life, as we have students completing VCE and VET subjects for the first time, and we prepare for the introduction of our second campus.

At school council, we farewelled councillors Adrian Repka, John Barnes and Lisa Wilson, with heartfelt thanks for their contributions, and welcomed three new councillors: staff representative Madeleine Campbell and parent representatives Livia Bonazzi and Karyn Myers. We also welcomed student representatives to school council for the first time, and have benefitted from the perspective provided by Mary Do and John Yu. While we are always sorry to see councillors depart, we actively seek fresh ideas and viewpoints, and I encourage all parents and carers to consider standing for school council in 2016.

In February this year, school council adopted a new Strategic Plan for 2015-2018. Governing the second phase of the school's growth, the Strategic Plan aims to maintain and enhance our culture of excellence and engagement. It sets high targets for VCE results and aims to improve literacy and numeracy results for Years 7-9. The Strategic Plan also seeks to broaden the choices available to our senior students by offering the International Baccalaureate (IB) from 2017.


A key focus for school council this year has been ensuring the development of our new Year 9 campus in Bay Street, Port Melbourne. This will allow us to accept up to 250 additional students, expanding our ability to serve the local community with high quality public education. We have been fortunate to receive a further \$2.5m in funding for the project from the Victorian Government, to complement nearly \$200,000 in donations from companies in our area. However, the project would not have been possible without generous donations from the school community. Thank you!

Energetically led by Michelle Robin, APC Families continues to find new ways for our parents and carers to be involved in school life. To our regular events such as the Art Show, Vaudeville, Trivia Night, camps, bike rides and hikes, we have added a welcome picnic, second-hand uniform stall, new evening speakers and social evenings.

I look forward to the 'completion' of APC in 2016, with all six years of secondary schooling on offer. And I look forward to continuing to develop all facets of the school as part of our goal to remain at the forefront of education.

Students managed to raise almost \$2,300 for St. Vincent De Paul to support the work they do with the homeless community in Australia. Well done to all students involved.






